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## **Programme Specific Outcome**

- 1.** Students will gain empirical knowledge of human beings and their ancestors through time and space and in relation to physical character, environmental and social relations, and culture.

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Course Code	Course Name	Course Outcome
ANTGCC01	DSC-1A: Foundation of Anthropology	Gain knowledge about the basics of Anthropology like its subject matters, scopes, aims and objectives, different branches, uniqueness and significance of the subject, etc.
ANTGCC02	DSC-1B: Biological Anthropology	It helps to gain knowledge about the past and present evolution of the human species and is especially concerned with understanding the causes of present human diversity. It encompasses human palaeontology, evolutionary biology, human genetics, comparative anatomy and physiology, primate behaviour, human behavioural ecology, and human biology.
ANTGCC03	DSC-1C: Archaeological Anthropology	It enriches the knowledge about the systematic study of human past through material remains and also how to examine diverse remnants of human actions through excavation, recovery, and material analyses. Cultural systems through time and space are reconstructed by examining ancient social, political, religious, and economic systems through both a regional and comparative perspective.
ANTGCC04	DSC-1D: Social-Cultural Anthropology	It helps to understand the human similarities and differences and their impact on a wide range of social phenomena through the methods uniquely suited to studying social phenomena at different scales within a historical and political context as well as it helps to analyze what unites diverse peoples as well as what distinguishes them from one another.
ANTGSE01	SEC-1: Tourism Anthropology	Students will come to learn about the social and cultural nature of tourism, the behaviour of tourists, and the impacts of tourism on the lifestyles, traditions and cultures of local people, residents or 'hosts', and the like.
ANTGSE02	SEC-2: Visual Anthropology	It teaches to look at the visual aspects of a culture, such as art and media, and also how anthropological data can be represented visually as it is much easier to show a photograph of a painting than to describe it in detail through words. Students will learn to study a wide range of cultural aspects, including art, dance, ritual, jewelry, body adornments, and much more.
ANTGSE03	SEC-3: Medical Anthropology	Students will learn how health and illness are shaped, experienced, and understood in light of global, historical, and political forces from an anthropological perspective. The diverse ways in which cultural, social, and biological factors influence human experiences of pain, illness, suffering and healing in different settings will also be learnt. In addition, through the knowledge of medical anthropology students will be able to investigate the social, political, and economic contexts in which health behavior and health systems are shaped.

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<b>ANTGSE04</b>	SEC-4: Earliest Evidences of Urbanisation in India	Understand the rise and fall of ancient civilization through the earliest evidences of urbanisation in India.
<b>ANTGDS01</b>	DSE-1: Human Growth and Development	Students will get basics, importance and understanding of human growth and development from anthropological perspectives.
<b>ANTGDS02</b>	DSE-2: Social Movements among Indian Tribes	It gives knowledge with regards to the tribal movements/struggle in India during the British rule as well as tribal social movements in the aftermath of independence due to political autonomy, agriculture and forest, language and script, etc.
